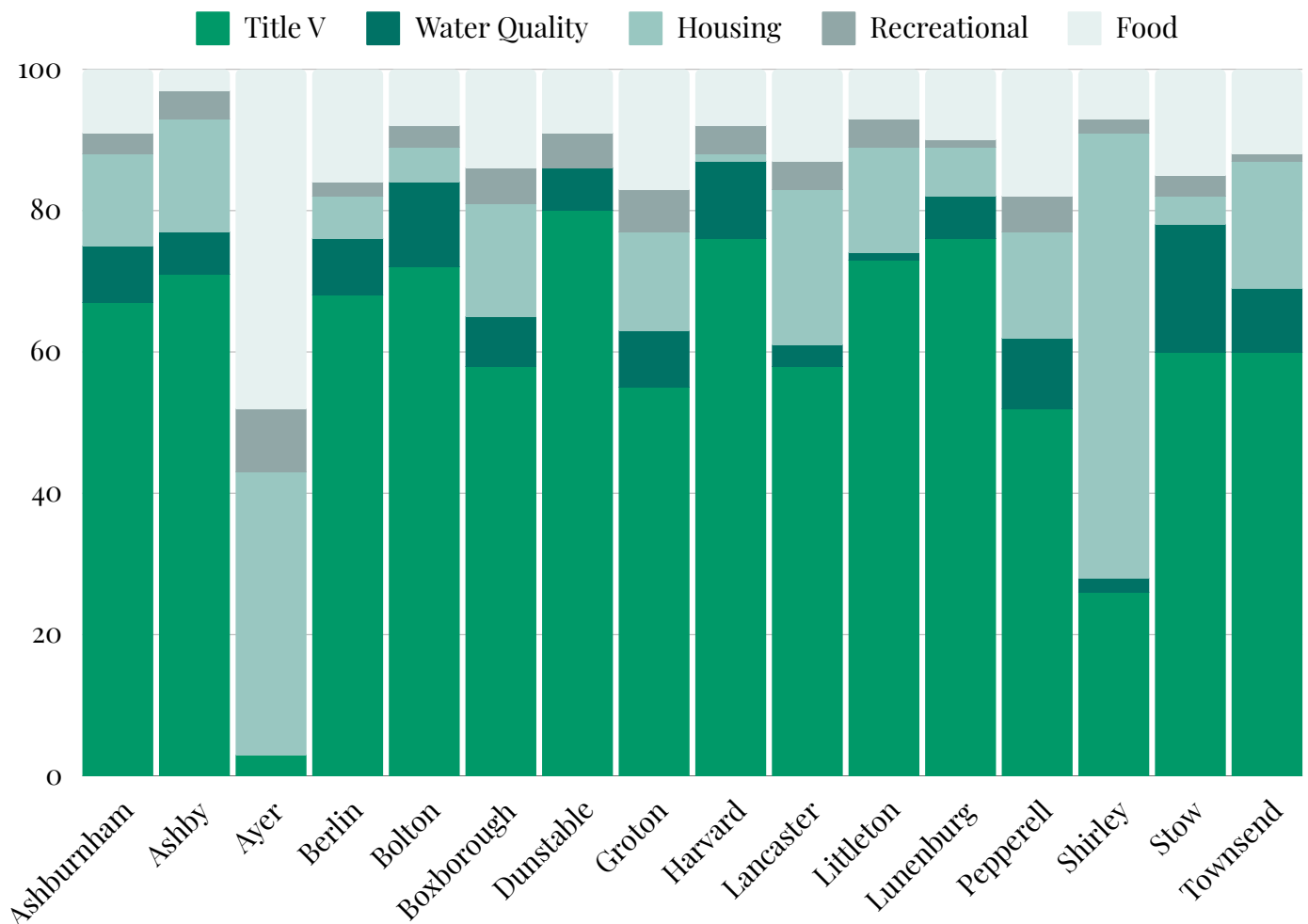
ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH SERVICES



The Environmental Division enforces State Sanitary and Environmental Codes, Massachusetts General Laws, and local regulations in partnership with state agencies like the Department of Public Health (DPH) and the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP). Our services include housing inspections, sewage disposal systems, restaurant inspections, public pools, bathing beaches, rabies control, wells, and rubbish haulers.

Our staff collaborates with local Boards of Health and the general public to address environmental and public health concerns across the sixteen towns in the Nashoba region. Additionally, our health agents are available in the Town Hall of member communities and at the office in Ayer to assist the public with questions or concerns they may have.

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING AND COMMUNITY HEALTH SERVICES



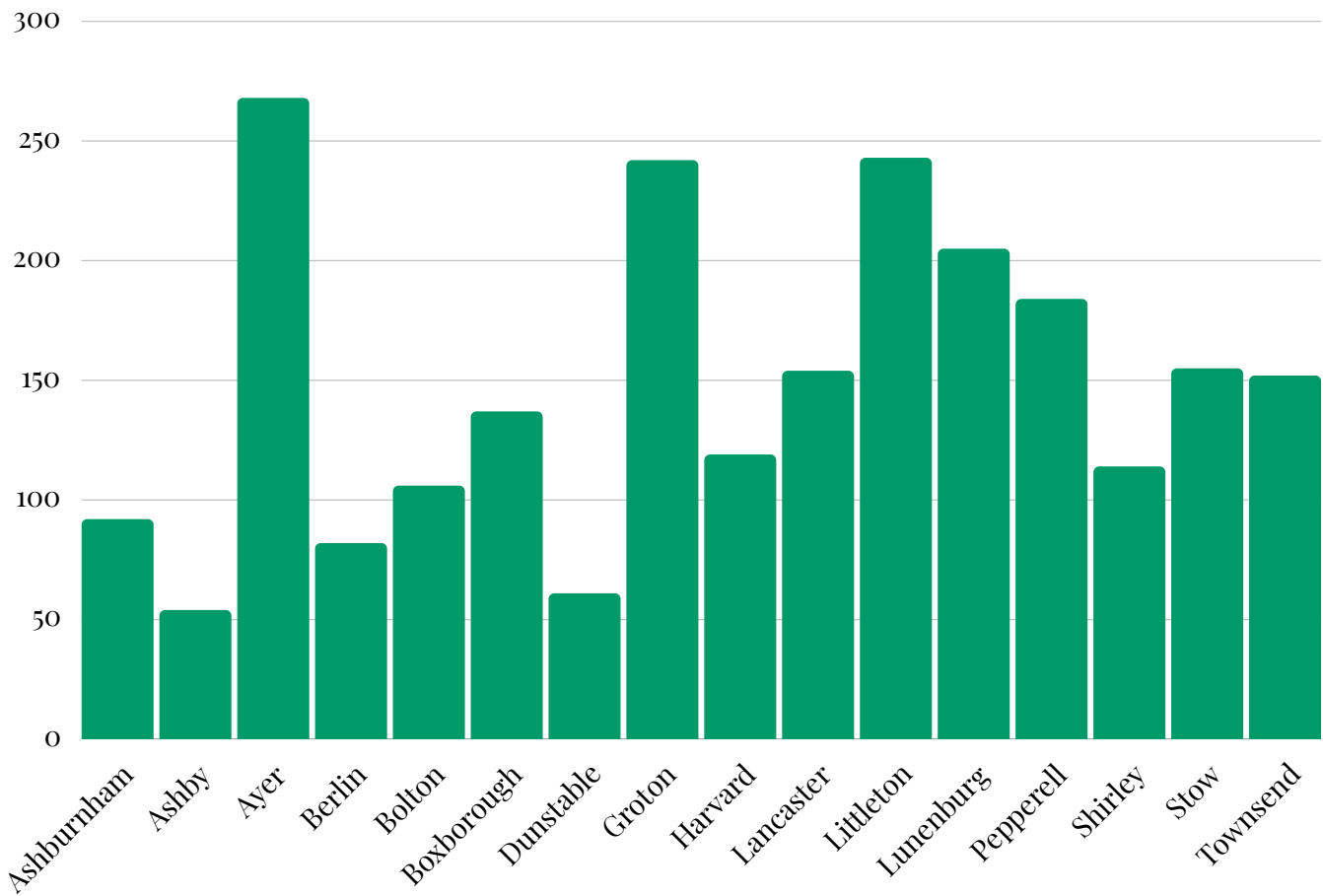
The Public Health Nursing team at Nashoba Associated Boards of Health aims to promote wellness across all ages in our sixteen member communities following the Scope and Standards of Public Health Nursing as outlined by the American Nurses Association.

Core Services Provided:

- We hosted 17 flu clinics throughout the year, providing community members with accessible flu shots. These clinics played a key role in reducing the spread of influenza and safeguarding the health of our neighbors.
- Investigated Communicable Diseases:
 - We worked closely with the Mass. Department of Public Health to investigate and manage communicable diseases.
- Town Nurse Hours:
 - We held regular “town nurse hours” across the district, offering guidance, advice, and care to local residents.
- Information & Resource Referrals:
 - We provided clear health information and connected individuals with essential community resources.
- Consultation, Education & Outreach:
 - We conducted personalized consultations and community education sessions to empower residents to make informed health decisions.
- Outbreak Response:
 - When health emergencies arose, we responded promptly to contain and manage outbreaks.
- Home Visits:
 - We carried out home visits to ensure that those who could not visit our clinics still received the care they needed.

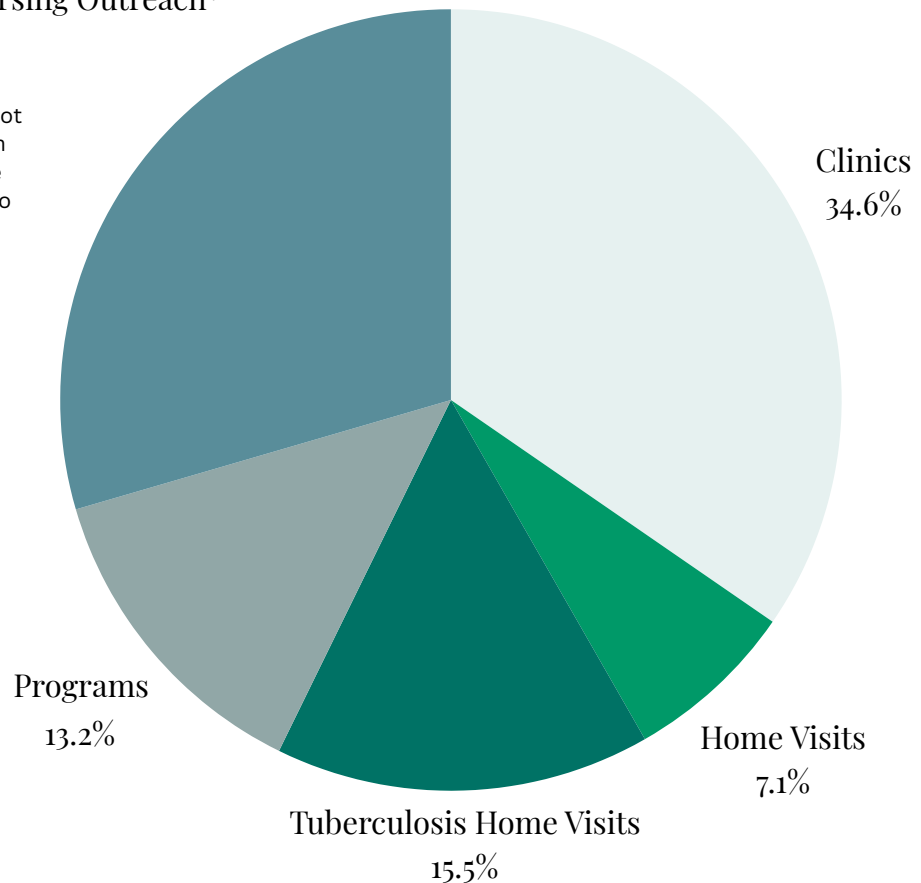


Other Public Health Nursing Services Conducted in 2024

Grants

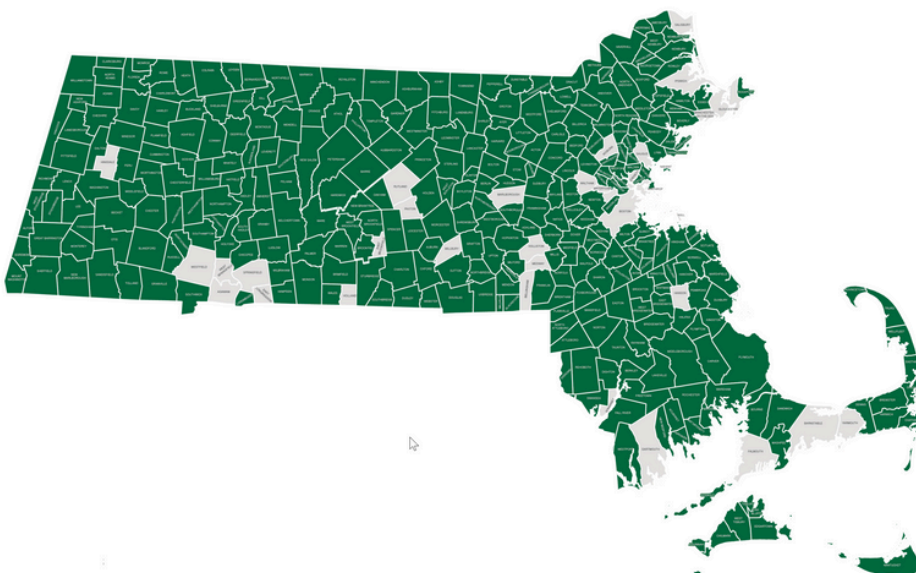
Public Health Excellence Grant and Contact Tracing/Case Investigation Grant

In 2024, the Nashoba Associated Boards of Health (NABH) continued to advance regional public health through the ongoing support of two key grants: the Public Health Excellence (PHE) Grant and the Contact Tracing and Case Investigation (CT/CI) Grant. Awarded in 2022, these grants have supported the gradual expansion of NABH's staff, strengthening its capacity to deliver critical public health services.

Since 2022, the PHE Grant has enabled the onboarding of staff over time, including Kelli M. Calo, Shared Services Coordinator (part-time); Kolby Beauvais and Cara Olejarz, Health Agents (full-time); Jenna Montgomery, Public Health Educator/Communications Specialist (full-time); and Meghan O'Neil, Food Inspector (part-time). This growing team has enhanced NABH's ability to provide inspections, community outreach, and health education, fostering a more robust and adaptable public health infrastructure across participating municipalities.

The CT/CI Grant has further supported NABH by funding a full-time Public Health Nurse, Alicia Lepardo, and enabling enhancements to the regional public health database, incorporating advanced analytical tools to improve data tracking and reporting.

Together, these grants have strengthened NABH's ability to meet evolving community needs, improving disease surveillance, emergency preparedness, and equitable access to high-quality public health services. Through a collaborative and resource-sharing approach, NABH has built a resilient and modern public health system that continues to effectively serve all member communities.

2024 Highlights



Nashoba Associated Boards of Health (NABH) achieved significant milestones in 2024, emphasizing public health innovation, community engagement, and regional collaboration.

Mental Health and Grief Support

- Certified 1 staff as a Mental Health First Aid Instructor, leading two Adult Mental Health First Aid certification classes to strengthen mental health awareness and response capacity.
- Secured funding for a pilot grief support program through the Haley Cremer Foundation, Emerson Health, and the Community Foundation of North Central MA.
- Delivered a Grief & Healing presentation at the MA Women of Color Coalition North Central MA Chapter Regional Meeting.

Community Health Engagement

- Hosted Community Health Focus Groups across eight municipalities, gathering critical insights on local health priorities.
- Co-organized the Bridges to Health: Building Thriving Community Partnerships conference, in collaboration with CHNA9, MPHA, MAHB, and OLRH, to advance regional collaboration and health equity.
- Participated in transportation planning for North Central MA through the “Future of Mobility” initiative.
- Worked with CHNA9 and the Healthy Aging Collaborative on age and dementia-friendly initiatives in the region.

Health Care Access and Advocacy

- Advocated against the proposed closure of Nashoba Valley Medical Center through public hearings, local meetings, and attended a press conference, highlighting its critical role in regional healthcare.
- Launched the Nashoba Valley Health Care Access Visioning Project in partnership with CHNA9, ASNCM, and HCFA, including visioning sessions focused on older adults, veterans, and the general public.

Public Health Capacity Building

- Conducted three opioid abatement funding technical assistance sessions for NABH municipalities, supporting their efforts to utilize opioid settlement funds effectively.
- Joined the State’s Community Naloxone Program (CNP) to improve regional access to life-saving overdose reversal tools.
- Participated in HRIA Overdose Rescue Training-of-Trainers to expand overdose prevention and response capabilities.
- Coordinated a State-sponsored flu and COVID vaccine clinic to increase vaccination rates.

Regional Collaboration and Leadership

- Participated in the inaugural Nashoba Valley Health Planning Working Group to advance long-term health planning efforts.
- Initiated a virtual regional monthly meeting for Council on Aging (COA) leaders to enhance communication and collaboration across municipalities.
- Hosted the Annual COA & Outreach Appreciation Luncheon to recognize and celebrate the contributions of local outreach teams.
- Participated in key statewide public health conferences, including the Massachusetts Health Officers Association (MHOA) and Massachusetts Public Health Alliance (MPHA) annual conferences.
